We have been in existence for 37 years and are very proud of this program that we can provide advice to our residents in Mayland Heights and Vista Heights. Our newsletter is published FOUR times a year and if you still want a hard copy of it, you can have one delivered to your place of residence by the following method. The block watch program works closely with the Calgary Police Association and provides you with tips on various topics plus crime stats on a monthly basis on our website. One of the things the Calgary Police stress to us over the years is when You witness a crime in progress, that if you are able to gather some valuable information that would be very helpful. BUT DO NOT PUT YOURSELF at risk when trying to obtain this information. Confrontation of a suspect is not the way to go about this as it puts you at risk. Leave that up to the police. A few years ago an individual actually did this in Vista Heights. He was trying to save his vehicle from being stolen. A very risky thing to do. This individual ended up with stab wounds and ended up in the hospital.

Crossroads Block Watch has an updated website that has lots of information in it that tells you how to secure your home, vehicles and other valuable personal items. There are numerous phone numbers to help you out when you have some issues. Please take advantage of this website asit was created with you in mind. A few topics we wanted to share this quarter are the following:

KIJIJI/Facebook Market Place

Both KIJIJI and Facebook Market Place are great tools to buy and sell items. However, many interactions do not go as planned, leaving many buyers and sellers with a loss of merchandise such as cell phones or clothing, or even worse, getting physically hurt. Calgary police advise Sellers of property on these platforms to be cautious of buyers.

HOMELESS/ENCAMPMENTS

As a service we know many are frustrated with the amount of homeless and homeless camps in the communities. Calgary Police Service, Bylaw Services, Encampment Teams, and the Alpha House will be conducting regular sweeps throughout the district of offer help to any homeless and panhandlers. School is back in session and hopefully everyone is getting back into their routines. While you are out and about watchout for the kids as they are making their way to and from school. Keep in mind that the city of Calgary residential speed limits changed May 31, 2021. Unless otherwise posted, the speed limit is 40 Km/hr on residential roadways and collector roads. The speed limit in a playground zone, which have replaced school zones, is 30 Km/hr and is in effect 365 days a year between 07:30am and 21:30pm (09:30pm). Lastly, the speed limit in alleyways continues to be 15 Km/hr.



With Hallowe'en quickly approaching, I've provided some safety tips to help ensure everyone enjoys the evening. As well, I have added some reminders on protecting your debit and credit cards. Crime and disorder continue to be relatively low in the Mayland and Mayland Heights areas and comparable to other communities with similar populations. Please, keep watching out for your neighbours and reporting suspicious behaviour. Remember that a crime in progress can be reported to 9-1-1 otherwise utilize the non-emergency number, (403)266-1234. KEEP HALLOWEEN TRICK-OR-TREATERS SAFE

Halloween is a fun and exciting time of year for kids of all ages, but it can pose some potential hazards. The Calgary Police Service would like to remind parents, drivers and homeowners about a few tips that will make Halloween safe and fun for everyone.

Tips for Trick-or-Treaters and Parents

- A bright costume with reflector tape will make children more visible to drivers.
- Costumes should not be highly flammable or interfere with easy walking.
- If children are wearing masks, the masks shouldn't interfere with their vision: better yet, use face paint instead.
- Try to trick-or-treat while it's still light out.
- An adult should accompany younger children.
- Older kids who are mature enough to be unsupervised should travel in a group.
- Parents should help their kids plan a route and set a time to be home.
- Remind children never to go beyond the doorway, and not to talk to strangers.
- Parents should also remind children to stay on the sidewalk and only cross the street at intersections.
- Let your children know not to take shortcuts through alleys and abandoned areas, but to stay in populated, well-lit areas.
- It's a good idea for kids to carry a flashlight and to have a cell phone or some change for a pay phone in case there's a problem.
- An adult should inspect the candy to make sure it hasn't been tampered with.

Tips for Homeowners

- Turn on your porch light to let children know they're welcome.
- Remove obstacles such as lawn ornaments and gardening tools from yards.
- Place decorations out of the way so that nobody trips.
- The safest way to light a jack-o'-lantern is with battery-powered lights. If you use candles, make sure the flame can't come into contact with a child's costume.

Tips for Drivers

- When children get excited, they tend to forget the most basic safety rules, especially around traffic. If you're driving, slow down and be extra cautious in residential areas.
- Drive defensively: expect children to dart out from between parked cars.
- Watch carefully for people using pedestrian crossings.

SWIPED: HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF FROM CREDIT CARD AND DEBIT CARD FRAUD

It takes just seconds to become a victim of credit card or debit card fraud — and it can take a lot longer to repair the damage done to your finances. The most common way people fall victim to this type of fraud is by losing a credit or debit card with an easily compromised personal identification number (PIN), or through the counterfeiting of a credit card that is temporarily out of the owner's hands (the thief may copy the information from the credit card and use it to make a duplicate card).

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Protect yourself from fraud. You can save yourself a lot of time and trouble by taking these simple precautions, recommended by the Calgary Police Service:

- Always know where your debit cards and credit cards are care for them as carefully as if they were cash.
- When you use your card (at a restaurant or gas station, for example), try to keep the card in sight at all times.
- Watch carefully to ensure your card is only swiped in a proper debit machine. "Skimmers" are devices used to steal credit or debit card information. They are about the size of a napkin holder and can easily be concealed.
- Use an unusual PIN not your phone number, licence plate, birth date, or something simple such as four zeros.
- Cover your hand when entering your PIN to prevent others from seeing it, even at Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs).
- If you think your PIN has been observed, change it.
- Do not allow anyone access to your accounts. Never give your card and PIN to anyone.
- Never provide your credit or debit card number to anyone by phone unless you called them and you know they are a trustworthy company.
- When you are shopping over the Internet, stick to trusted websites that use up-todate security measures (look for the padlock symbol on the web page).
- Don't write your PIN down for safekeeping. If you really need it in writing, store it in a secure location such as a bank's safety deposit box, well away from your cards.
- When you use your debit or credit card, double-check that you have replaced it in your wallet following the transaction.
- Know what you are spending and check your statements to ensure they match your purchases. If there's a discrepancy, immediately notify your credit card company or bank.
- Store all the information from your cards in a safe place to make it easy to report them if they are lost or stolen.
- Regularly check your wallet. If you discover a card is missing, cancel it immediately don't wait (if you wait, you might be held responsible for any misuse of it).
- Only carry the cards you need. Leave the others in a secure place.
- When you receive a new card in the mail, sign and activate it immediately, and destroy the old one.
- Check your credit report regularly this is free of charge once a year through Equifax Canada (www.equifax.ca; 1-800-465-7166) or Trans Union Canada (www.tuc.ca; 1-800-663-9980).

Q: I am in the community. How do I become involved in Block Watch?

A: Contact your respective District Coordinator or the Chairperson. If you do not know how to contact these individuals contact the **District 4 Police Office at (403) 428-6400 for Mayland Heights** or the **District 5 Police Office at (403) 428-6500 for Vista Heights** and ask for the CRO.

Q: How do I report and incident?

A: Obtain as much information as possible - description of the suspect, direction or travel, vehicle make, colour and license plate. **Report this activity to Calgary Police** Service at (403) 266-1234. If this is a crime in progress, always call 911.
